Getting Started

- Attendance
- Motion to Open Debate (Simple Majority)
- Motion to Open the Speaker's List (Simple Majority)
 - Specify speaking time
- Motion to Set the Agenda (Plurality)
 - Motion to set the agenda on____
- All this may be done by the chair



The Speaker's List



- Default state of debate
- Most formal speaking
- Longest speaking time, around 1-2 min
- Speak at the front of the room
- Chair keeps a running list of delegates
 - to start out and after each speech, the Chair will ask if anyone would like to be added
- 3 Yields



Moderated Caucuses

- 30 second to 1 minute speaking time
- Speak at your table or front of the room (up to chair)
- May or may not set a specific time (up to chair)
- Motion for a __ minute moderated caucus with a speaking time of __ to __
- Raise placards to speak
- No formal list



Unmoderated Caucuses

- No organization
- Get up and move around the room
- Plan strategies
- Write Bills
- Motion requires simple majority
 - Motion for a ____ minute moderated caucus to ____
